The Mystery Within a Mystery

THEY improv: Comedy is Murder

Some people prefer to have something to surprise their guests and to be in on the action. These clients don't mind something a little bit more complex as long as it has the desired effect. A little misdirection can go a long way towards providing a quality night of entertainment. For this, we have the **Mystery Turducken**.

THEY improv has come up with their own version of a mystery Frankenstein's monster. Pieces of several things go into this creation. It begins with a mystery, usually. This is often the mystery where some of your people play characters. Everyone gets into it and has a great time. One of our Directors runs the event and has some small problems with the staff of the chosen venue, or catering staff played by our people. People recognize the tension in the room but mostly don't think that much about it. The murderer is revealed and our Director gives prizes to the winners, followed by a toast to congratulate them on a good game. Upon taking a drink, the Director dies! It now becomes an Ambush Mystery.

The idea is to hide a prank in plain sight. They all knew they were having a mystery, they just failed to realize that there was a second mystery to follow!

The budget is a little bit more due to the needed quality of the cast and number of people that we will have onsite. We can also play this with the actual staff of the venue, but we would need to make certain that they are on board with the hijinx to follow.

Question 1: Is the first mystery game real?

Absolutely! It is played with the same intentions as if there wasn't a second mystery to follow. We will also get the same information from you and they'll play either the Cambridge Solution or the Dartmouth Plan. We can do this with other things, like a game show, etc., but it then is just an Ambush and not a Turducken.

Question 2: How long is the event?

There are now two events. Just realize, though, that the first event is the setup portion for the second. This means that the whole event is more likely to be 60-120 minutes. It depends on a lot of factors and our clients make those decisions..

Question 3: Are there different winners?

Probably. The reality is that they are two independent mysteries in one show. So, if the winner of the first still is the most correct for the second, they would win both. If not, then you would have different winners.

Question 4: I'm still confused. How can I understand it better?

Simply call and ask. It seems to be easier by phone. Otherwise, you can look at the Tear Sheets for the Cambridge Solution or the Dartmouth Plan. Then the one for the Ambush. Instead of a Stand-up Comedian who dies in the Ambush, it's the host of the first mystery.
